Due to its rich culture and history, Mexico is the 6th most visited country in the world and home to 39.3 million safe tourists annually. The country ranks first in the Americas and seventh in the world by the number of Unesco World Heritage sites, has the 11th largest economy in the world, and is a member of The United Nations, The World Trade Organization, the G8+5, the G20, The Uniting for Consensus, and The Pacifica Alliance.

The truth is that Mexico is safer than many major U.S. cities. Some people are quick to judge Mexico based on isolated incidents they see on the news and thus form opinions that are based on stereotypes and overly sensationalized press that is often inaccurate. MOST TOURIST AREAS IN MEXICO ARE SAFER THAN MANY MAJOR U.S. CITIES.

Visitors from around the world enjoy traveling to popular and vibrant U.S. cities like Miami, Chicago, New Orleans, Washington, D.C., Atlanta, and Philadelphia, yet each of these cities is statistically less safe than popular Mexican destinations such as Cabo San Lucas, Cancun, and Puerto Vallarta.

Travel Alert vs. Travel Warning

As of July 16, 2018, the U.S. Department of State confirmed that major international tourism destinations in Mexico are safe!

Travel alerts and warnings are regularly issued by the U.S. government for more than 100 countries around the world. Keep in mind the difference between an alert and a warning is significant. A *warning* is issued to describe a long-term, prolonged condition that makes a country unstable, whereas an *alert* is used to circulate information about short-term conditions. An *alert* is not intended to discourage US citizens from traveling, but rather to make them be more alert and aware of their surroundings. *It is not intended to inhibit travel*.

The U.S. State Department currently lists the primary tourist areas in Mexico in the same classification as a significant number of countries that are among the most common destinations for American travelers, including the UK, Denmark, Belgium, and Germany.

These tourist areas include Cancun, Los Cabos, Tulum, and Puerto Vallarta, among others. Each are listed as a level 2 on a four level scale.

- 1 Exercise Normal Precautions
- 2 Exercise Increased Caution
- 3 Reconsider Travel
- 4 Do NOT Travel

NATURAL WORLD HERITAGE

IN MEXICO

Issued by **UNESCO**, Natural World Heritage sites encompass monuments or natural sites with cultural or historic wealth for humanity. Mexico has 34 sites: 27 are cultural, six are natural, and one is mixed.



Natural World Heritage since 2005

Islands and islets with endemic fauna, coral reefs and marine mammal mating zones.

EL PINACATE ET LE GRAND DESERT D'ALTAR

Biosphere Reserve

Natural World Heritage since 2013

Steep formations caused by volcanic activity, with such species as bighorn sheep and the Gila monster.



EL VIZCAÍNOBiosphere Reserve

Natural World Heritage since 1988

Just North of Cabo, the gray whale comes here to mate. There are also whale sharks, sea lions, and seals.



CALAKMUL

Cancun

Playa del Carmen

Mixed World Heritage since 2014

A scenic drive from Cancun and Riviera Maya, here the tropical rainforest and a Mayan city coexist.



ARCHIPELAGO REVILLAGIGEDO

Natural World Heritage since 2016

Four islands in the Pacific Ocean with steep formations and marine animals. This includes the Marieta Islands outside of Puerto Vallarta, home to indigenous birds such as blue-footed boobies and red-billed tropical birds





Natural World Heritage since 1987

Famous for forested islands (petenes) and 100-foot-tall trees.



MONARCH BUTTERFLY

Biosphere Reserve

Natural World Heritage since 2008

Habitat of the monarch butterflies that migrate from Canada.




FUN FACTS ABOUT MEXICO

- With 31 states, Mexico is the fifth largest country in the Americas, covering almost two million square kilometers (760,000 square miles) and the 13th largest independent state in the world.
- With an estimated population of over 120 million, Mexico is the eleventh most populous and the most populous Spanish-speaking state in the world, as well as the second most populous nation in Latin America.
